Reporting incidents to the police

Social media and messaging apps have become a useful tool in letting people know of crime, suspicious behaviour and anti-social behaviour etc to neighbours, friends and local community groups **BUT** we definitely would like to know first.

Time and information can be crucial in determining the correct response to an incident. There is also the possibility that offenders and evidence could be lost.

<u>Our advice is – Contact us first, then consider your social media response.</u>

Vigilance warning after sports club burglary – Welford on Avon

Our Stratford Safer Neighbourhood Team Inspector is urging local sports clubs to be vigilant after silver trophies were taken from a club in Welford-on-Avon on Friday

At around 3.50am, two unknown offenders are understood to have pulled into a car park on Mill Lane. One stayed in a grey/silver SUV-style car, which had its licence plate covered, while the second suspect walked round the side of the building before forcing entry inside and taking the trophies.

Insp Jake Kibblewhite said: "Enquiries are ongoing and we're keen to hear from anyone who might have seen anything.

"Although this appears to be a one-off incident, I'd like to take this opportunity to remind other clubs in the area to be extra vigilant with their security.

"Please make sure you're locking all the doors/windows and if you have CCTV, that it is switched on at all times.

Equally, if you witness any suspicious activity or something doesn't seem right, please let us know."

Our research confirms that nearly a fifth of the public have known about a crime but chose not to talk to the police (according to insights drawn from various research projects commissioned by Crimestoppers).

Some of the reasons for people not speaking out include:

- I do not want to talk to the police.
- I need to report someone I know.
- I am worried that others will know if I speak out.
 - I am not sure if what I know will help.
 - I do not want to get involved with courts.
