Alcester Police SNTs. Latest Weekly Report. Saturday 4th April 2026

Based at Alcester Police Station, The Safer Neighbourhood team's primary roles are around crime prevention, problem solving both long standing or emerging issues of community concern and community engagement. We are supported at Alcester by colleagues from Patrol teams whose role is to respond to incidents and investigate crimes that occur in the area 24/7. The SNT is supervised by Inspector Jake Kibblewhite who leads on Neighbourhood Policing for Stratford District and Sgt Ebbs who also oversees neighbourhood Policing in the Shipston on Stour area. The Alcester SNT currently consists of 2 Police officers and 5 Police Community Support Officers, and our contact details are shown above.

Alcester continued.....

ASB Wakefield Way / Kinwarton Farm Road area. Four motorcycles riding around the area causing a general nuisance especially with the noise - revving engines etc. Reported on the 31st March. Ongoing problem around the area.

ASB. High Street. Two males on an e-bike riding dangerously in the area. Both dressed in dark clothing and face coverings. 1pm 4th April. 0172 04/04/2026

ASB. Station Road. Youngsters seen on roof of buildings causing a danger to themselves. 4.15pm 31st March

Targeted efforts reduce ASB in locations across the county.

Antisocial behaviour is the most commonly reported concern for residents across Warwickshire. When antisocial behaviour and serious violence happen, it doesn't happen in a vacuum. It happens in a place – which means that to target it, we have to take a tailored approach to wherever that place is.

We have to use different tactics depending on the location and the circumstances.

Just taking Leamington as an example – in the Pump Room Gardens in Leamington, where we were receiving frequent complaints, our efforts have resulted in a 90% reduction in serious violence and ASB from 2024 to 2025.

These are more than just numbers – that's nine-out-of-ten real occasions every year in which someone was hurt or affected by antisocial behaviour that aren't happening anymore.

Similarly, we received a lot of reports about street drinking in Leamington, and there was one club in particular we were called to frequently for incidents of assault and violence.

By the end of twelve months, we were only getting one-in-four of the reports in ASB, and serious violence involving street drinking in the town was reduced to nearly half of what it was before (44%).

What's more, the club saw a 75% reduction in serious violence and ASB, and reports of violence resulting in wounding dropped to zero over the four-month period we measured for.

It's not just in Leamington – in Nuneaton, a certain restaurant in the town centre that was struggling with the impact of ASB, and serious violence has had a 64% reduction in crime measured over six months.

That's what Op Resolve is all about – targeted, data-backed interventions, delivered by area and at the right time.

OVERSLEY WOODS – ASB RESULT

This week, colleagues from the Alcester Safer Neighbourhood Team (SNT) made us aware of concerns raised by members of the public regarding anti-social behaviour involving off-road motorbikes in Oversley Woods and surrounding areas.

Oversley Woods is a notable area of ancient woodland, carefully protected and managed for its biodiversity—home to bluebells, wild cherry, and mature oak. It is not a place where motorbikes are permitted, and the impact of illegal riding on both the environment and other users is significant.

With this in mind, RCT officers attended the location the same day. It didn't take long before three off-road motorbikes were located riding within the woods and across nearby farmland. Officers attempted to engage with the riders; however, they chose not to stop.

While searching the area, officers were approached by several dog walkers and horse riders who reported close encounters with the bikes. Members of the public also provided valuable video footage of the riding and key information about the direction of travel.

Working alongside colleagues from Stratford Patrol A Shift, the three riders were located nearby shortly afterwards.

All three bikes were seized, and the riders have been dealt with for the offences identified.

This incident serves as a clear reminder: if you ride, you are responsible for knowing where you can and cannot legally do so. Areas such as Oversley Woods are protected for a reason—both for wildlife and for the safety and enjoyment of everyone who uses them.

We recognise that many riders enjoy off-road biking responsibly and within the law. Unfortunately, it is the actions of a small minority that risk damaging the reputation of the wider riding community.

We will continue to act on information provided and will use all resources available to us—including drones, 4x4 vehicles, and if appropriate our own off-road bikes—to address illegal activity in our rural spaces.
